## California Student -Teacher Ratio is Very High

California has 20.9 students per teacher, compared to a national average of 15.5.
$\checkmark$ That means we exceed the national average by 35 percent!
California actually helps to raise the national average. Only 17 of the other 50 jurisdictions (the other states plus the District of Columbia) have a student-teacher ratio that is higher than the average of 15.5 to 1 .

Vermont has the nation's lowest student/teacher ratio, at 10.8 to 1 , about half as many students per teacher as California. The number of students per teacher in some of the other large states is:

- Florida-16.4
- Illinois-18.1
- Massachusetts-13..2
- New Jersey-12.4
- New York-12.8
- Ohio-16.6
- Texas-14.8
- Wisconsin-14.8

Even the "rustiest" of the rust belt states of Michigan (17.5 to 1) and Pennsylvania (15.5 to 1) have student-teacher ratios that are well below California's.
$\checkmark$ Having 35 percent more students per teacher than most other states means that California's students are denied the same level of student-teacher contact and individual attention as most students receive nationally.

It also results in more difficult classroom management and less quality instructional time during the school day.
