More than four in 10 graduates of California's public high schools in 2013 took an Advanced Placement exam before graduating, compared to little more than one in four when the tests were first offered a decade earlier, according to the College Board's 10th annual 23-page "AP Report to the Nation." The number scoring at least 3 out of 5 on an AP exam rose to 26.9 percent, making California one of just 17 states to score above the national average of 20.1 percent. The College Board named El Monte Union High School District the 2014 AP Equity and Excellence District of the Year among medium-sized districts, and as the California Department of Education noted, 28 other districts in the state made the College Board's national honor roll. Not all the news was good; the College Board statistics document stubborn disparities in participation and results among student subgroups. A 15-page California Supplement drills down into those data and outlines "strategies to build a robust AP Program" and opportunities "to build an even stronger AP program."

CSBA honors Sen. Roth as Outstanding Freshman Legislator

Riverside-area state senator was early supporter of LCFF

Sen. Richard Roth, D-Riverside, was honored last week as CSBA's 2013 Outstanding Freshman Legislator in a ceremony at the Riverside County Office of Education. CSBA President Josephine "Jo" Lucey and President-elect Jesús Holguín, along with Region 18 Director Lynne Craig, made the presentation in recognition of Roth's devotion to meeting the needs of public school students and enhancing opportunities for youth. Representing the 31st state Senate district, Roth was an early supporter of the state's new Local Control Funding Formula for K-12 schools. He serves on the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the Joint Committee on Emergency Management, as well as several Senate policy committees. "We're proud to honor Senator Roth for his commitment and dedication to California's schools and students, and his partnership with school boards throughout his Senate district," Lucey said. Smarter Balanced releases Common Core Training Tests

The latest Smarter Balanced update from the California Department of Education reports that the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium has released new Training Tests to familiarize teachers and students with new assessment software and computerized test formats that will be field tested this spring as part of the continuing launch of new Common Core State Standards. Training Tests in English-language arts and math are available in three "grade bands": grades 3-5, 6-8 and high school. Training Tests contain the same types of items as the previously released Practice Tests but do not include performance tasks or scoring guides. Torlakson nominates 'Green Schools' for U.S. award

The Long Beach Unified School District's Lowell Bayside Academy and Twain Elementary School and the entire Encinitas Union School District are California's public school nominees for the U.S. Department of Education's third annual Green Ribbon School Awards.

"I am proud to recognize these outstanding schools and district for their comprehensive efforts to green their campuses, their communities, and our state," state Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson said in **announcing** the nominations. "Together with efficient facilities and good health practices, a strong ecoliteracy education develops students into citizens who will be lifelong stewards of our environment." The awards program promotes energy-efficient schools that have created healthy environments for students and staff, among other qualifications. National winners will be named on Earth Day, April 22. CSBA updates policy brief on transgender students AB 1266 could be challenged, but other protections already in place

The status of Assembly Bill 1266, permitting transgender and gendernonconforming students to access sex-segregated activities and
facilities consistent with their gender identity, remains uncertain
pending an effort to challenge the law via referendum. However, other
state and federal laws prohibit discrimination, harassment, intimidation
and bullying on the basis of gender identity, so CSBA has updated its
policy brief, "Providing a Safe, Nondiscriminatory School
Environment for Transgender and Gender-Nonconforming
Students" (posted on our Policy News and Briefs Web page).
Additionally, clients of CSBA's Policy Services can access a special
edition of three related sample board policies and administrative
regulations to help local educational agencies accommodate such
students' needs while ensuring the privacy of all students. LEAs
should consult legal counsel as necessary when adopting policy on
this issue.
