Governor signs budget with additional funds for districts

Troubling trailer bill language would cap local reserves

Governor Jerry Brown signed the 2014-15 budget and most of the budget trailer bills on Friday, June 20 in San Diego. Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins, D-San Diego, and Senate Pro Tem Darrell Steinberg, D-Sacramento, joined the governor at the signing ceremony. The budget contains some good news for districts, including \$4.8 billion for the Local Control Funding Formula (this is \$250 million higher than the Governor proposed), and \$400.5 million for payments of the backlog of K-12 mandate claims, which can be used for CCSS implementation. There were also some late-in-the-process changes, among which is the troubling last minute trailer bill language to cap local reserves. Before the bills were signed, CSBA called upon the governor to either veto the bill (Senate Bill 858) containing the language or to ask the Legislature to clean it up before the end of this year's legislative session. The governor signaled that he was aware of the issues being raised by CSBA and other management groups, but that he would not entertain proposals to change it until after the November election.

Call to attend July 10 State Board of Education meeting

LCFF permanent regulations to be discussed

Emergency Local Control Funding Formula spending regulations were passed in January 2014. Now the State Board of Education is due to consider and take action on the permanent regulations. CSBA and ACSA are asking board members and superintendents to attend the SBE meeting on Thursday, July 10 at 8:30 a.m. to urge SBE members not to alter the core principles of the LCFF regulations. More than 200 school administrators and board members came together at the January SBE meeting to present their stories of LCFF implementation, which helped produce a positive outcome—regulations that prioritize the statewide commitment to equity for students with greater challenges, while also ensuring flexibility for local communities to tailor programs that advance student achievement. CSBA and ACSA ask that you testify again—or for the first time—before the SBE. There is

likely to be vocal opposition to the regulations in their current form, which means it is all the more critical that SBE members hear from practitioners in the field and governing board members about the good work being done. We ask that you attend the July 10 SBE meeting in teams to tell more of your LCFF stories—how local communities and stakeholders have been engaged in developing Local Control and Accountability Plans. New School-Based Medi-Cal Administrative Activities program effective July 1

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) announced the decision to proceed with the implementation of the revised School-Based Medi-Cal Administrative Activities (SMAA) plan effective July 1, 2014. The SMAA program helps to ensure that children are enrolled in the Medi-Cal program and able to access health services through their schools. The federal Medicaid program, operated under the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), reimburses 50 percent of SMAA program costs. Following its audit of the program, CMS deferred school district and COE claims for reimbursement totaling more than \$360 million. CSBA will continue to follow up with Secretary Diana S. Dooley for updates on past claims. Despite concerns raised by education stakeholders, DHCS submitted the draft SMAA plan to CMS. It awaits final approval. Additional information can be found on the DHCS's SMAA Web page. CSBA advises districts to work closely with their SMAA coordinators throughout the implementation process. CSBA will continue to provide updates on this program until all unresolved issues are addressed.
