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#### CSBA, partners, work to repeal the cap on local reserves

Governance leaders' advocacy efforts needed

CSBA continues to work on repealing the cap on local reserves. To do so, CSBA is collaborating with a coalition of education organizations, including ACSA, CASBO, school districts and county offices of education as well as public interest groups to urge the Governor and Legislature to repeal the cap. The cap on the level of reserves that districts may maintain was passed as part of the education budget trailer bill. SB 858. Section 27. and is now in Education Code 42127.01. The statutory requirement becomes operative in the following situation: (1) voters pass Proposition 2, the state "Rainy Day Fund" and (2) the state makes a deposit into the state-level Proposition 98 Reserve that is created pursuant to Proposition 2. Both conditions must be met. CSBA seeks a repeal of this statutory provision so that it will not become operative should Proposition 2 pass. CSBA is not proposing to repeal the increased transparency requirements contained in a separate section of the trailer bill. Those transparency requirements are in Education Code 42127(a)(2)(B) and require a district to provide greater information and public discussion on the reasons for a reserve level higher than the minimum recommended for economic uncertainties. #### Most high school students attend some college Report highlights importance of life-long learning

A recent report from the National School Boards Association shows that the majority of high school students attend at least some college, with four out of five attending two- or four-year schools by age 20. By age 26, the number of high school students who have not attended a two- or four-year college is only 12 percent. The NSBA's Center for Public Education report, The Path Least Taken: A Quest to Learn More About High School Graduates Who Don't Go on to College, underscores the importance of ensuring high schools prepare students to be life-long learners. Although non-college track students took fewer and less rigorous courses than those planning on going to college,





many are still likely to take two- or four-year college courses. As such, they need to be prepared, the **CPE report**, based on the class of 2004, says.

## New online tool to help administrators CDE offers resource to help with local-level planning

The California Department of Education has launched a new online tool, the **Quality Schooling Framework**, to provide guidelines and best practices to administrators. The QSF aims to help school leaders with planning, policies and financial decisions as they work toward local decision-making under the LCAP. Based on research, the QSF centers on 10 areas to improve teaching, testing, learning, leadership and home-school connections. The online tool is a result of CDE efforts to share its resources as a way to improve schools across California, an initiative known as **A Blueprint for Great Schools**.

#### New site for supportive discipline Resources available to help end "zero tolerance"

A new website, **The National Clearinghouse on Supportive School Discipline**, provides resources on positive school discipline and ending "zero tolerance" policies. As part of this, the NCSSD site has topic pages dedicated to Conditions for Learning, The Pipeline to Prison, Positive Approaches and Discipline Disparities. There is also a resource site for each state, including California. The NCSSD aims to reduce exclusionary discipline, which it says contributes to a "pipeline to prison." Instead, the organization advocates supportive discipline methods and provides related reference guides, intervention strategies and tip sheets.
