State Board takes action on accountability, assessment

Suspends API for 2014-15, favors multiple-measures accountability system

By unanimous vote, the State Board of Education suspended the Academic Performance Index for the 2014-15 school year at its meeting on March 11. Instead, SBE aims to develop and launch a new accountability system as early as fall 2016. State Board members and other public education stakeholders expressed a shared goal of moving away from the API's single-number measure, which is based exclusively on student test scores, to a system of multiple measures as recommended by the Public Schools Accountability Act Advisory Committee. These measures could include expulsion and suspension rates, graduation rates and even the condition of school facilities. "We heartily support moving to a multiple-measures system of accountability, as was initially envisioned even in the early days of the API," CSBA Senior Director of Policy & Programs Teri Burns said in a memo sent to the State Board. "Districts and county offices of education are complex entities that serve communities in many different ways, meeting the needs of diverse groups of students and parents. It is critical that schools be judged on how they are serving their communities, not on a single metric." Read the full story on CSBA's website.
