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### State update: Legislature celebrates School Board Recognition Month



Two legislative resolutions declaring January School Board Recognition Month have been adopted by members of California's Legislature. Both [House Resolution 60](#) and [Senate Resolution 53](#) were adopted unanimously.

**"School Board Recognition Month is an ideal time to recognize and celebrate the**

**Californians serving on school district governing boards and county boards of education** who help guide the education of pupils in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12,

inclusive, and **who prepare these pupils for the opportunities and challenges of the 21st century and beyond**," the resolutions state. "The [Assembly and Senate] hereby declares the state's appreciation to every school board and school board member in California and **recognizes their dedicated commitment to serving the needs of pupils in our communities by proclaiming the month of January 2024 as School Board Recognition Month**; and be it further resolved that the [Assembly and Senate] of the State of California **urges all community members to join in recognizing the dedication and hard work of local school board members and to work with local school board members to create an education system that meets the needs of all of our children.**"

As January comes to an end, **CSBA is looking back at the accomplishments made on behalf of school district and county board of education members in 2023 and ahead at the new laws impacting K-12 education in 2024.**

The [2023 Year in Review](#) shares the ways in which the association supported boards through legislative victories, policy guidance,

**original research, trainings, communications, legal representation and more.** Some highlights include securing \$1.7 million in grant funding from the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative to expand CSBA's pilot workforce housing project, the return of the CSBA Roadshow, and advocacy wins in Sacramento, Washington, D.C. and in courts across the state. ## Communicating before, during and after a crisis: Expert tips for LEAs

A Jan. 23 CSBA webinar featured expert tips from local educational agency leaders on best practices for crisis communications before,



**during and after a safety incident.** Whether handling a social media, email or other anonymous threat, or the presence of a trespasser or suspicious object on a school campus, **every LEA — no matter its location, size or resources — should have plans in place to address crisis situations.**

“Our schools are under more pressure than I’ve ever seen before and quite honestly, we’re dealing

with things that are born out of new technology, so we’re hearing about things that are posted to social media anonymously,” said Trinette Marquis, executive director of the California School Public Relations Association. “Is it a real threat? We don’t know, but we always have to treat it as if it is. There are so many more incidents and the worst thing about that is it gets in the way of student learning.” **Preparation and practice are two elements that LEAs can master pre-emergency.** [Read a full recap on the CSBA blog »](#)

## IQC approves revisions to local instructional materials adoption guidance



The Instructional Quality Commission (IQC) met on Jan. 24 to consider recommendations on the revised Guidance for Local Instructional Materials Adoptions, determine various leadership and committee positions and approve 2024 goals.

During the session, IQC members approved recommendations to the State Board of Education

for the proposed revised Guidance for Local Instructional Materials Adoptions document. A few of the most significant requested edits to the guidance include additional references to Social Content Standards, California’s Education Code and pertinent legislation; additional calls for parent involvement throughout the processes; links to resources on dyslexia and supporting English learners; new figures, including an Instructional Materials Decision Tree; and more support, including a timeline, for starting and conducting the review process. ## CSBA Delegate Assembly election: Ballots due March 15



Ballots for this year’s CSBA Delegate Assembly, in subregions that have elections, were mailed to school districts and county offices of education by Feb. 1. **Completed ballots should be returned to CSBA’s West Sacramento office and must be postmarked by the U.S. Postal Service no later than Friday, March 15, to be valid.** All districts, county offices of education and

candidates will be notified of the results by April 1. Run-off elections will be conducted in the case of tie votes.
