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CSBA ranked one of the most influential advocacy organizations



On June 12, *CalMatters* published a ranking of the **100 most influential lobbying organizations** in the State Legislature based upon which organizations have been most successful in passing their agendas during the current session. Thanks to the passionate and persistent advocacy by CSBA and members on issues of the utmost importance to public education across the state, **CSBA was ranked 18th**. Among the 32 bills CSBA took a position on, the association's desired outcome came to pass 96 percent of the time.

"Although member satisfaction is our primary concern, it's nice to receive external validation acknowledging CSBA as a powerful advocate for California's public schools and governing boards," said **CSBA CEO & Executive Director Vernon M. Billy**. "This is precisely why we invest in advocacy, member mobilization, public affairs campaigns and numerous other efforts to help empower members in their governance role and to secure the policies and resources necessary for student achievement."

"It's like I always say, 'Don't agonize, organize,'" said **CSBA Chief of Governmental Relations Patrick O'Donnell**. "CSBA is proud to support district and county office of education trustees in their own advocacy efforts, as well as to advocate on their behalf."

Last year alone, **CSBA advocacy propelled five sponsored bills to the Governor's desk and secured his signature** on a package of new laws aimed at increasing support for districts facing cyberattacks, providing immediate relief during the teacher shortage, helping county boards appoint student members and extending the opportunity for boards to meet remotely during states of emergency. **CSBA advocacy also secured vetoes of two significant measures** that would have eroded local control over hiring, disciplinary and other human resources decisions. Budget update: CSBA monitoring budget negotiations; prepared to protect Prop 98 in court




Even as Gov. Gavin Newsom considers [the budget passed by the State Legislature on June 13](#), CSBA continues to fight for the funding California students deserve and to see that schools receive every penny due to them under the law — especially where Proposition 98 is concerned. The latest example of this advocacy comes in the form of [CSBA's official objection](#) to the Department of Finance's

[proposed Proposition 98 certification](#) that was submitted by **CSBA CEO & Executive Director Vernon M. Billy**.

While CSBA remains **hopeful that upcoming budget trailer bills will alleviate all concerns about compliance with Prop 98 without litigation, challenging the certification leaves the door open for legal action — should the Association deem it necessary** — to ensure schools receive full Prop 98 funding as required by law. CSBA's **objection is rooted in the Department of Finance's plans to exclude \$2.6 billion in unallocated Prop 98 funds from the 2022–23 allocations to school districts and community colleges, reallocating it to the 2023–24 fiscal year**. This decision is not only contrary to the State Constitution, it undermines the intent of Prop 98 by artificially lowering future funding guarantees. **CSBA insists all allocated funds should be included in the certification calculations to maintain the integrity of Prop 98 and ensure consistent and adequate funding for education**.
