Legal update: Federal FERPA letter explained



The **Student Privacy Policy Office (SPPO)** is a division of the U.S. Department of Education tasked with, among other things, the administration of federal laws related to student privacy in schools and other local educational agencies that receive federal funds. Each year, two laws — the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and the Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment — require

the SPPO to provide notice to schools of their obligations related to student privacy matters.

This year, in addition to the notice, a cover letter was released on March 28, 2025, by the acting director of the SPPO that includes details of several “priority concerns” that the SPPO will take “proactive measures to address.” The letter concludes with a section describing “assurance of compliance.” In taking proactive action to enforce FERPA, the SPPO requested that each state education agency (the California Department of Education, in the case of California) submit “documentation such as ‘reports, information on policies and procedures, annual notifications, training materials or other information necessary’ to provide assurance that the State Education Agency and their respective LEAs are complying” with the law. This requested assurance will focus specifically on the areas of concern noted in the letter. The letter requests that state education agencies submit this assurance of compliance information by April 30, 2025. Legislation introduced to address the impacts of AB 218



CSBA's persistent advocacy to address the impact of Assembly Bill 218 (Chapter 861, Statutes of 2019) took a major step forward when Sen. Ben Allen (D–Santa Monica) **amended Senate Bill 832 last week to help safeguard the solvency of local educational agencies.** Allen, a former Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District board member, **included several important policy proposals to help address the ongoing financial impacts of Assembly Bill 218 and allow victims of childhood sexual assault to receive compensation for their suffering while insulating LEAs from the threat of bankruptcy based on claims dating back decades that are difficult to investigate and insure.**

With input from CSBA, the bill was amended to propose changes to AB 218 statutes, which would:

- Extend the timeline public agencies have to pay: 25 percent of the upfront damages and the rest over 20 years.
- Create a rebuttal presumption of validity for the judicial obligation bond validation process and allow the validity process for that bond to start earlier.
- Extend the amount of time schools have to pay emergency apportionment loans.
- Extend payment intercept mechanisms currently only available to the California School Finance Authority to school districts, community college districts, LEAs and education joint powers agencies in order to increase their credit rating.
- Increase the evidentiary standards for AB 218 cases that are more than 20 years old to clear and convincing evidence with corroborating evidence more than just the plaintiff's testimony.

State update: CDE under federal investigation for alleged FERPA violations



On March 27, the **U.S. Department of Education's Student Privacy Policy Office (SPPO)** **announced** that it had launched an



investigation into the California Department of Education (CDE) for alleged violations of Family Educational Rights Privacy Act (FERPA), a federal law intended to protect students' educational information by limiting its

disclosure to third parties and allowing parents access to their children's records.

The SPPO alleges that local educational agencies in California may “be violating FERPA to socially transition children at school while hiding minors’ ‘gender identity’ from parents. Given the number of LEAs that appear to be involved, SPPO is concerned that CDE played a role, either directly or indirectly, in the widespread adoption of these practices, which appear to be required by the recently enacted California Assembly Bill 1955.”

In response, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony **Thurmond** gave the following statement that appeared in *CalMatters* and other publications: “**Assembly Bill (AB) 1955 prohibits local educational agencies from mandating that staff disclose students’ gender identity to parents without student consent, unless otherwise required by state or federal law. AB 1955 does not mandate nondisclosure.** Based on the plain language of both laws, there is no conflict between AB 1955 and Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), which permits a parent access to their student’s written records upon request. **Our students must be safe in order to learn. I have heard from so many students and families whose safety has been impacted by forced outing policies.** To our LGBTQ+ youth and families, I want to make sure that you hear us as loudly as we hear you: You are heard, you are protected, and you are loved.”

In other state news:

- The [list of 2025 California Distinguished Schools](#), which includes 336 schools across 34 counties, was released on March 25. According to the CDE, the program recognizes schools in two categories: those doing exceptional work to close the achievement gap and those demonstrating exceptional student performance.
