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Legislative update: US Secretary of Education confirmation hearing on Feb. 13



The Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) Committee will hold the **confirmation hearing for Linda McMahon, President Donald Trump's nominee for Education Secretary, on Feb. 13 at 10 a.m. EST.** Her past experience includes an appointment to the Connecticut State Board of Education in 2009 where she served for one year prior to two unsuccessful runs to represent

Connecticut in the U.S. Senate in 2010 and 2012. In addition to her political background, she is a former small business owner and CEO for World Wrestling Entertainment.

Notably, it will be **President Trump's order to eliminate the U.S. Department of Education that will likely become the main focus of McMahon's confirmation hearing**. However, it is unclear whether Congress, especially the U.S. Senate, will have the necessary votes to fully eliminate the Department of Education. Established by President Carter in 1980, **it would take an act of Congress to abolish the department**. To do that would require 60 of the 100 senators voting to eliminate the department, which has been characterized as politically difficult, if not impossible, to accomplish. This is due to the Senate's procedural rule requiring 60 votes to overcome a filibuster to achieve a final vote, which would require Democratic support. Currently, the Republican majority holds a 54-seat majority.

If approved by the Senate HELP Committee, nominee McMahon's appointment to be the next Secretary of Education will be heard by the full U.S. Senate for final confirmation. If approved, she will then take her oath of office to become the 13th U.S. Secretary of Education in United States. Watch or listen to the hearing [here](#).

2024 NAEP results show poor performance overall, achievement gaps widening



The 2024 **National Assessment of Educational Progress** (NAEP) results, released on Jan. 28, covering mathematics and reading scores for students in grades 4 and 8 show that **while California has made some progress in catching up to the national average, more work remains. Over the past 25 years, California has made noteworthy progress in closing the gap between state and national averages**. For

instance, in 2003, there was a 10-point gap between California's average fourth-grade reading score (206) and the nation's average (216). In 2024, that gap closed to 2 points. That same year, the gap between California and the nation's eighth-grade average math score was 12 points; in 2024, the gap closed to 3. **Though the state is catching up, California's average still trails national averages in every tested NAEP domain.**

Similar to this year's state test scores, **racial and socioeconomic achievement gaps in California persist, showing that historically disadvantaged students are not being adequately served by the state**. For instance, in math, there was a 33 percent gap between Black and white students who scored at or above Basic, the lowest-performing category, in fourth-grade mathematics and a 7-point gap in eighth grade. In fourth-grade math, there is a 30-point average score disparity between economically disadvantaged students and those who are not (222 vs. 252). In eighth-grade math, the two groups have a 39-point average score disparity (254 vs. 293). These results are similar in reading.

The Feb. 6-7 meeting of the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) continued discussion of several long-term initiatives, including a review of initial recommendations for improving Teacher Performance Assessments (TPAs). The Workgroup to Review the Design and Implementation of the Teaching Performance Assessments **presented its initial**

recommendations, along with staff-recommended interim actions to address issues identified by the workgroup to provide immediate or near-term support to current teacher candidates. The workgroup was formed to provide an analysis of any modifications needed to current assessments to ensure they are valid and authentic to the work of teaching, reasonable to implement in the wide range of classroom settings across the state, and appropriate for beginning teachers. **Learn more »**
