Information, insight and influence: Coast2Coast delivers for governance teams



Assertive advocacy, practical policy and bipartisan spirit were on display as more than 300 California school trustees and superintendents converged on the nation's capital for the fourth annual CSBA-ACSA Coast2Coast Federal Advocacy Trip. As part of the largest delegation in Coast2Coast history, participants sharpened their advocacy skills, absorbed timely policy insight and

delivered an unequivocal message to Congress: strong public schools are America's best

investment, and California's 5.8 million students can't wait for political gridlock to clear before their needs are met. [Read a full recap on the CSBA blog »](#)

California's Rep. Kevin Kiley (R-03), Rep. Ted Lieu (D-36) and Sen. Adam Schiff (D) addressed Coast2Coast attendees on April 28 and April 29, delivering rousing speeches emphasizing the importance of education to the well-being of the population and prosperity of the United States and praising school board members for their vital public service. Then, on April 30, attendees fanned across the House office buildings on Capitol Hill to meet with congressional members and staff and deliver crucial messages gleaned from their own experiences and the key issue briefings offered by CSBA and ACSA. In their meetings, **Coast2Coast attendees asked Congress to take action on five key bipartisan priorities: protect core federal programs; fulfil the 40 percent IDEA promise; reauthorize the Secure Rural Schools Act; expand connectivity and cybersecurity; and tackle the educator workforce crisis.**

Legislative update: Agreement reached on literacy instruction reforms



Last week, a compromise emerged in the two-year saga to reform literacy instruction in California. [Assembly Bill 1454](#) was approved by the Assembly Education Committee with support from the backers of two competing bills. While the negotiations continue on some outstanding issues, **the current provisions in the bill provide more implementation flexibility for local educational agencies** as compared to

similar legislation proposed last session and again this year.

Key amendments include requiring an LEA to adopt instructional materials in English language arts/English language development approved by the State Board of Education at its next adoption for grades K-8; requiring the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to update program standards for professional preparation of candidates for a preliminary services credential with a specialization in administrative services; and requiring the state to make funding available to LEAs to provide professional development to certificated and classified staff who provide reading instruction to students in grades TK-5. State update: CDE sends letter on school discipline policies; Civic Learning Awards

On May 1, the California Department of Education (CDE) sent a **letter** to leaders of local educational agencies about updates to school discipline policies in response to the April 23 **executive order** "Reinstating Common Sense School Discipline Policies."

The communication outlines the department's concerns with the Trump Administration's action, asserting that "disproportionate discipline of students based on race is a real concern in our education system," and highlights the CDE's



work to address threats to the physical and emotional safety of students. The letter states that the CDE does agree, however, that “discipline must be applied in a non-discriminatory fashion in accordance with state and federal laws” and offered related resources.

Legal update: Attorneys general challenge proposed elimination of DEI initiatives



On April 25, a coalition of attorneys general, including the California Attorney General Rob Bonta, **filed a lawsuit** in federal district court challenging the April 3 U.S. Department of Education’s (ED) request that state and local educational agencies certify compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 — which prohibits discrimination on the basis race, color and national origin in programs receiving federal

financial assistance — based on the requirements related to diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) outlined in the ED’s Feb. 14 Dear Colleague Letter. Among the arguments advanced, **the lawsuit maintains that the certification requirement violates the Administrative Procedure Act and the U.S. Constitution on multiple grounds.**

In a related case brought by the NAACP in federal circuit court for the District of Columbia, the judge, on April 24, granted a preliminary injunction barring the implementation of ED’s April 3 Title VI certification requirement. The case by the attorneys general includes a greater scope of arguments that are distinct from those made in the NAACP’s case.
