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# WHAT'S NEW FOR 2016

This report provides a list of new legislation **signed into law** during 2015 that impacts K-12 education in California. All of the bills included in this report are items that CSBA has taken a specific position on or is closely monitoring due to an impact on schools. Included with each listing is the bill number, author, summary, CSBA's position, chapter number, sections of the Education Code and/or other Codes (i.e. Government Code, Health and Safety Code, etc.) which are affected, the date it becomes effective (typically January 1, 2016) and an indication of whether or not CSBA's board policies will be impacted.

The bills are also categorially sorted into four groups (see pages 3 and 4) based on the four pillars of CSBA's policy platform: **strengthen local governance, secure fair funding, improve conditions of children,** and **ensure achievement for all.** 

# **CSBA POSITIONS**

There are several different positions CSBA can take on a bill. They are:

**Cosponsor/Sponsor:** CSBA drafts the bill language, secures a Legislator to

serve as the bill's author and strongly pursues passage

**Support**: Actively monitor, pursue and lobby in support

**Support if Amended:** Support only if specific amendments are made

**Approve**: Approve in concept or "principle" but do not actively

lobby in support

**Oppose**: Actively monitor, pursue and lobby in opposition

**Oppose Unless Amended**: Seek defeat unless specific amendments are made

**Disapprove**: Disapprove in concept or "principle" but do not actively

lobby in opposition

**Neutral**: No action is taken

**Tracking:** Closely monitor the progress and potential impact but

do not take an active position

# STRENGTHEN LOCAL GOVERNANCE

### AB 30 (Alejo-D) School or athletic team names: California Racial Mascots Act.

Establishes the California Racial Mascots Act, which prohibits public schools from using the term Redskins as a school or athletic team name, mascot, or nickname beginning January 1, 2017.

# AB 215 (Alejo-D) Local agency employment contracts: maximum cash settlement.

Current law requires all employment contracts between an employee and a local agency employer to contain a provision that provides for the amount of a cash settlement that may be paid out if the contract is terminated, as specified. Current law provides the maximum settlement that an employee can receive. This bill provides that in the case of a district superintendent of schools, for contracts of employment executed on or after January 1, 2016, the maximum cash settlement shall be an amount equal to the monthly salary of the employee multiplied by 12.

# AB 304 (Gonzalez-D) Sick leave: accrual and limitations.

The Healthy Workplaces, Healthy Families Act of 2014 provides, among other things, that an employee who, on or after July 1, 2015, works in California for 30 or more days within a year from the commencement of employment is entitled to paid sick days for prescribed purposes, to be accrued at a rate of no less than one hour for every 30 hours worked. This bill requires that the employee do that work for the same employer in order to qualify for accrued sick leave under these provisions. This bill also excludes a retired annuitant of a public entity, as specified, from the definition of employee under these provisions.

# AB 306 (Hadley-R) Public schools: attendance alternatives: children of military personnel.

Prohibits a school district of residence from prohibiting the transfer of a pupil who is a child of an active military duty parent to a school in any school district, if the school district to which the parents of the pupil applies approves the application for transfer.

### AB 331 (Levine-D) School district governing boards: reduction of membership.

Authorizes a county committee on school district organization, for any school district whose average daily attendance during the preceding year was less than 300, to approve or disapprove a proposal to decrease the membership of the school district governing board from 5 to 3 in accordance with those specified procedural requirements. To the extent that the bill imposes new duties on county committees on school district organization, it constitutes a state-mandated local program.

### AB 375 (Campos D) School employees: sick leave: paternity and maternity leave.

Under current law, when a certificated school employee exhausts all available sick leave, as specified, and continues to be absent from his or her duties on account of illness or accident for an additional period of up to 5 school months, the employee during that additional period receives the difference between his or her salary and the sum that is actually paid a substitute employee employed to fill his or her position during his or her absence or, if no substitute employee was employed, the amount that would have been paid to the substitute had he or she been employed. This bill additionally provides the differential pay benefit described above for up to 12 weeks if the certificated school employee is absent on account of maternity or paternity leave, as defined, as specified.

# AB 547 (Gonzalez-D) Elections: special elections: all-mailed ballot elections.

Authorizes, until January 1, 2021, San Diego County, or any city, school district, community college district, special district, or other district or political subdivision whose boundaries are located wholly within San Diego County, to conduct an all-mailed ballot special election or special consolidated election to fill a vacancy on the legislative or governing body of those entities.

### AB 594 (Gordon-D) Political Reform Act of 1974: campaign statements.

Recasts the requirements for filing preelection statements and would repeal other reporting requirements, including supplemental preelection statements and supplemental independent expenditure reports.

# AB 809 (Obernolte-R) Local initiative measures: ballot printing specifications.

Current law requires that the ballots used when voting on a proposed county, city, or district ordinance submitted to the voters as an initiative measure have printed on them specified text relating to the proposed ordinance and dictates the placement of that text. This bill also requires that if the ordinance proposes to impose a tax or raise the rate of a tax to be levied, the ballot include in the statement of the ordinance the amount of money to be raised annually and the rate and duration of the tax to be levied.

# AB 915 (Holden-D) Public education employees: industrial accident or illness leaves of absence: travel restriction.

Current law requires the governing board of a school district to provide by rules and regulations for industrial accident or illness leaves of absence for employees. Current law requires an employee receiving benefits pursuant to these provisions to remain within California during periods of injury or illness, unless the governing board authorizes travel outside the state. This bill removes the travel restriction on an employee receiving these benefits.

# AB 991 (Committee on Public Employees, Retirement, and Social Security) State teachers' retirement.

Makes various technical changes to existing teachers retirement law, including revising the definition of credited service for purposes of STRS to include service for which required contributions would have been made in absence of specified federal limits. The bill defines "leave of absence" as a period of leave to which a member is entitled that is expressly authorized or required pursuant to specified provisions.

#### AB 1020 (Ridley-Thomas-D) Elections: voter registration.

Current law provides that a person is entitled to register to vote if he or she is a United States citizen, a resident of California, not in prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony, and at least 18 years of age at the time of the next registration. This bill provides that a person is entitled to preregister to vote in an election if, among other things, that person is at least 16 years of age.

# AB 1101 (Bonilla-D) Pupil school enrollment: residency requirements: policy on investigations.

Current law authorizes a school district to make reasonable efforts to determine that a pupil actually meets the residency requirements, as specified, if an employee of the school district reasonably believes that the parent or legal guardian of the pupil has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency. If a school district elects to undertake an investigation, as specified, this bill requires the governing board of the school district to adopt a policy regarding the investigation of a pupil to determine whether the pupil meets the residency requirements for school attendance in the school district before investigating any pupils. The bill also specifies certain requirements and limitations to be included in the policy.

# AB 1339 (Santiago-D) School district employees: merit system: appointments.

Current law, until December 31, 2015, in a school district with a pupil population over 400,000, authorizes an appointment to specified classifications of positions to be made from other than the first 3 ranks on the eligibility list if one or more of specified criteria are required for successful job performance of the position to be filled, in which case the appointment would be required to be made from among the highest 3 ranks of eligible applicants on the list who meet the special requirements and are ready and willing to accept the position. This bill extends the operation of these provisions, except for the information technology solution technician classification provision, until December 31, 2020.

# **SB 148** (McGuire-D) School districts: reorganization: local control funding formula.

Enacts numerous provisions specifying computations to determine the funding, pursuant to the local control funding formula, of school districts that are, or proposed to be reorganized.

#### SB 178 (Leno-D) Privacy: electronic communications: search warrant

Existing law provides that a search warrant may only be issued upon probable cause, supported by affidavit, naming or describing the person to be searched or searched for, and particularly describing the property, thing, or things and the place to be searched. Existing law also states the grounds upon which a search warrant may be issued, including, among other grounds, when the property or things to be seized consist of any item or constitute any evidence that tends to show a



felony has been committed, or tends to show that a particular person has committed a felony, or when there is a warrant to arrest a person. This bill prohibits a government entity from compelling the production of or access to electronic communication information or electronic device information, as defined, without a search warrant, wiretap order, order for electronic reader records, or subpoena issued pursuant under specified conditions, except for emergency situations, as defined.

# **SB 242** (Monning-D) School security: surplus military equipment.

Current federal law authorizes the Department of Defense to transfer surplus personal property, including arms and ammunition, to federal or state agencies for use in law enforcement activities, subject to specified conditions, at no cost to the acquiring agency. This bill requires the governing board of a school district that has established a school police department to prohibit that school police department from receiving surplus military equipment pursuant to the above-described federal law unless specified conditions are satisfied, including a public vote to approve acquisition of the property and certain public notices.

### SB 415 (Hueso-D) Voter participation

SB 415 is aimed at increasing voter turnout by consolidating local elections held in "odd years" with statewide elections. Effective January 1, 2018, local subdivisions (including school districts and counties) would be prohibited from holding an election that is not concurrent with a statewide election date; the only exemption would be if the local subdivision can demonstrate that local voter turnout in an odd year was not more than 25 percent less than the average turnout within that subdivision for the previous four statewide elections.

# SB 532 (Leyva D) Governing boards of school districts: nonvoting and preferential voting pupil members.

Current law requires the governing board of a school district maintaining one or more high schools to appoint to its membership one or more nonvoting pupil members if pupils petition the governing board to make those appointments. This bill requires the governing board of a school district to appoint the pupil member or members within 60 days of receiving the petition, or at its next regularly scheduled meeting if no meeting is held within those 60 days, as specified.

# **SECURE FAIR FUNDING**

### AB 104 (Committee on Budget) Education finance: education omnibus trailer bill

Current law provides supplemental funding to qualifying California state preschool classrooms, and requires a part-day preschool program to provide parenting education and to provide staff development for teachers in participating classrooms as a condition of receiving funds. This bill includes within the meaning of parenting education for these purposes improving parental knowledge of local resources for the identification of and services for developmental disabilities, and includes as part of staff development the development of improved behavioral strategies and the provision of interventions for young children to improve kindergarten readiness. The bill contains one-time and ongoing funding and statutory changes for a number of K-12 education programs, including \$3.2 billion per-ADA allocation for adult education, child care and development, early childhood education, educator effectiveness, career technical education and other programs
