





The California Department of Education is gathering public comment on a new framework for teaching history and social science. The draft framework, **History–Social Science Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve**, will provide guidance for teachers, administrators, and parents on implementing a content-based curriculum. According to the CDE, the draft "covers more recent historical events, reflects changes in the law since the last framework was adopted in 2001, and helps educators teach the critical analytical skills students need for 21st century careers." The draft framework and a "field survey" are now posted **here**. Comments on the draft can be sent to the **CDE**. The comment period will remain open until Nov. 25.

September Attendance Awareness Month wraps up Early awareness of truants is key

With September recognized as Attendance Awareness Month, State Superintendent of Schools Tom Torlakson and CSBA Director-atlarge, Hispanic, Kathryn Ramirez address the importance of not missing school in two new **CSBA blog posts**. **Torlakson** writes: "A child who misses just one day of school a week is a whole grade behind his or her peers by the time they reach middle school. And do you know what the most predictive indicator is that a student will not graduate from high school? Chronic absence in sixth grade." And **Ramirez**, a board member of the Salinas Union High School District, comments, "We must acknowledge that far more needs to be done if we are going to close race-based achievement gaps that are all too persistent in California. The solution begins with attendance.

Webcast on Promise Zones for economic development Communities invited to apply for federal program to boost middle classes

It's not too late to **register** for today's noon webcast on the Obama administration's **Promise Zones** competition for urban areas. Promise Zones are part of President Obama's plan to create a new pathway to the middle class through partnerships with local communities and businesses. The goal is to create jobs, increase economic security,

improve educational opportunities, and reduce violent crime. Urban, rural, and tribal communities nationwide are invited to put forward a plan to partner with community leaders. In exchange, these designees will receive priority access to federal investments that further their strategic plans, federal staff on the ground to help them implement their goals, and five full-time AmeriCorps VISTA members. The first five Promise Zones are in Los Angeles, Philadelphia, San Antonio, southeastern Kentucky, and the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma. The Department of Housing and Urban Development intends to designate six new urban communities, while the Department of Agriculture intends to designate at least one rural community and at least one tribal community. Applications are due by Nov. 21. Urban, rural, and tribal application guides and frequently asked questions are **posted** here.
