

#### Delegate Assembly meeting focuses on 2015 issues Over 200 delegates convene to discuss next steps in adequacy, governance and more



CSBA's Delegate Assembly met this past weekend, May 16-17, at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Sacramento. Highlights included Saturday morning regional caucus meetings, followed by new delegate orientation, President Jesús

Holguín's report and CEO & Executive Director Vernon M. Billy's report. While there were many issues to discuss during the two days, repealing the reserve cap and funding adequacy was at the center of many discussions. Holguín said of working toward adequacy, "CSBA is and will continue advocating for adequate funding for education ... we are looking at defining what is the adequate level of funding for education in California, so that we can work in a collaborative manner to achieve that level." The Education Legal Alliance also gave updates on legal cases, along with an Adequacy Committee Report followed by breakout sessions. Breakout sessions allowed delegates to discuss and brainstorm in small groups the kind of future schools they could create if they weren't limited by funding, and how school members could make these future schools a reality. Featured speakers at Delegate Assembly included Robert Manwaring, presenting on adequacy, and Hedy Chang discussing reducing chronic absences. ### Deadline extended to ensure survey results reflect full CSBA membership

The deadline to complete CSBA's iCount member survey has been extended to Monday, June 15. The extension has been offered to ensure that all CSBA members have the opportunity to complete the survey, and that the results accurately reflect the voice of governing board members and superintendents throughout California. All CSBA members received an email on April 27 containing a link to one of two corresponding surveys — one for governing board members and one for superintendents. The survey marks the second phase of CSBA's comprehensive iCount data-gathering campaign, and it represents a key element of CSBA's long-term planning efforts. By completing the survey, you have an opportunity to exercise your voice in the association by offering valuable feedback about CSBA services and critical statewide education issues. More than 2,000 board members completed the iCount census, and it is crucial that this participation level be matched when the survey concludes. # Ed-Data updated with new data, enhanced functionality

Website provides timely, comprehensive data on K-12 education in Calif.

Ed-Data is a free website that provides educators, policy makers, legislators, parents and the public with timely and comprehensive data about K-12 education in California. Launched in 1996, the website was recently overhauled to include new data and improved functionality. New data include five-year trend charts on student demographics at the school, district, county and state levels as well as on student performance and on student enrollment-ADA comparisons. Also available are unduplicated counts of English learners, foster youth and students who are eligible for a free or reduced-price meal; 2013-14 financial data; and general information about schools and districts. Functionality was updated to provide enhanced search; ability to download data in Excel; ability to print, copy and share presentations on social media; and more. Other updates, including demographic and salary data on teachers, are scheduled for future release. Ed-Data is a partnership of EdSource, the CDE and Fiscal Crisis & Management Assistance Team, who work together to ensure that the data are accurate and presented in a way that promotes thoughtful discussion about how data relate to student achievement.

The federal government has renewed the program for 2014-15, but California will only receive approximately \$49 million this year (compared to the \$200 million made available in 2013-14).
